JOHN MOORES Graduate entry medicine courses:

Four year courses (further training is necessary afterwards)

You can apply to these course if you are about to complete (or have completed) a degree course.

Courses are listed on UCAS.com, look for courses with 'graduate entry' after them.



Training to become a doctor:

Four year graduate medicine course followed by:

Foundation programme (two years) followed by:

Training towards a medical <u>speciality</u> or GP Training

It can take many years to train towards some medical specialities



Academic entry requirements for graduate medicine degree courses:

Academic entry requirements vary considerably amongst different universities

Make sure to do your research and check what is required by individual universities

websites and contact
admissions staff
directly if you have any
queries

Competition:

Very high number of applicants per place for graduate entry medicine courses

Produce the strongest application possible

Make sure that you have a back up plan


Application process for medicine:

Apply by 15th October the year before you wish to start the course

Check if you need to sit additional tests (BMAT, GAMSAT, or UCAT)

Work hard on your personal statement

If you need to sit additional tests, you usually have to do these before you make your UCAS application
